The Power of Parents


Because insight into the real experiences of diverse communities in the county is crucial to relevant and impactful decision-making, three Parent Councils and a Parent Council Advisory **Committee** have been formed. Our parents, all with living experience with preterm birth, are integral to PTBi activities through their membership in the Steering Committee, each of the work groups (including positions as work group chairs), and planning committees for events such as World Prematurity Day and Community Forums. Parent Council members receive support for their involvement through stipends, social support and relationship building, policy analysis and advocacy training, and personal development opportunities.

Parent Council for Dads

n January 2018, PTBi convened a group of fathers to discuss the formation of a Parent Council for Dads. During this meeting, the dads brainstormed ideas and decided it was a great idea to have monthly meetings and officially create the PTBi's first Council for Dads! The dads decided to meet on the last Monday of each month at the Lighthouse for Children with Allen Hodgkin as their acilitator, who also co-chairs PTBi's Parent Council Advisory Committee.

Parent Councils for Moms

Starting in early 2017, two Mom Councils were formed, one for nglish-speaking moms, and one or Spanish-speaking moms. These others, all with living experience partners in every aspect of resno County PTBi.



African American Youth Leadership Academy (AAYLA) and Keeping it Real (KIR)

The Parent Council Advisory Committee consisting of 13 African American leaders who serve throughout the initiative and meet quarterly to provide critical insight into the unique needs and perspectives of African American families. To improve birth outcomes the committee is addressing health education; and inequity and discrimination with an emphasis on whole family integration, early education, and family resiliency. After thoughtful consideration of community organizations in Fresno County, the committee developed recommendations that lead to the creation of Keeping it Real (KIR) and African American Youth Leadership Academy (AAYLA).

Keeping it Real

Keeping It Real Program is for African American fathers and young men in Fresno County. The Keeping It Real Program is a 12week program for African American fathers that will utilize the national Noble Young Man curriculum. This curriculum promotes, cultural understanding, leadership, development and raising children with pride. It is based on the philosophy that male youth need other men, their family, and community to prepare for true manhood. Each session is 1.5 hours. Dinner, stipends, and raffles are provided.

The African American Youth Leadership Academy (AAYLA) is for African American Mothers and young women. It covers topics on leadership skills, development, social iustice issues, racism, reproductive and mental health, and civic engagement. Its goal is to provide leadership development opportunities for women. Each session is 2 hours. Dinner, gifts, and raffles are provided.

World Prematurity Day

Community Forums
